Hasting Plants is a seasonal greenhouse operation, specializing in annual and perennial flowers and vegetable plants. We feel we have one of the best selections in the area and try to live up to our slogan that "We're well worth the drive". We do not handle trees and shrubs, or do design or installation work. This leaves us more time to grow and produce the best selection of herbaceous plants for you. We are open for business from the middle of March until the middle of June (We actually start working in the greenhouses in January every year). The season might vary according to the weather. We grow almost all of our plants, which we feel is a great bonus for you in variety and quality.

DATES TO KNOW:

Onion Slips should arrive the first of April. We'll carry Vidalia, Super Star, and Candy varieties

Sweet Potato Slips should arrive the first week of May

Hasting Plants has been dedicated to bringing you exceptional garden plants since 1982. We hope you feel we live up to our motto "We're well worth the drive"

At Hasting Plants we price our perennials with blue tags, and our annuals with white tags. We hope this helps prevent any confusion.

If you are planning only one visit to Hasting Plants this year due to distance, may we suggest you plan your visit between April 15 and May 15 for the best display and selection.

We were able to patch #5 up until the next time I change the plastic. But #6 had more serious problems, and the plastic we had just installed a few months earlier had to be removed to make the repairs. Thankfully it is up and running again.

Greenhouse #4 underwent major renovations, since the north end was in bad shape. We have worked all fall and into the winter to get it rebuilt (the weather just didn't cooperate). When I started this letter, it was still uncovered!

We were fortunate to get plastic over it on a calm day in March (there weren't too many of those!). Even though Hasting Plants is open for a few short months we seem to work on it all year long.

This spring added to the drama with a flood lasting 2½ weeks! One full week it was too deep to get out, but the last 1½ weeks we were able to drive through the water in our dump truck. There are some great new wind spinners, and new bamboo wind chimes. We really loved our Wallaroo hats last year – some have 50 SPF, and they are very well made. We also have a few men's styles this year. My husband used one last year and really liked it.

There are lots of solar items, new bud vases, great frog, rabbit, and turtle statues. One of my new favorites are some glass leaf wind chimes. Perky Pet added a line of functional and decorative hummingbird feeders that are easy to clean. There is a lot of St Louis Cardinal and Cubs merchandise including totems, birdhouses, and door mats. We added some cute new fairy items as well. One new item is actually on the playground -a Monkey Jump. We loved it at the show & bought a couple to sell. Every time we passed the display, we had to jump on it... so adults and kids can play and enjoy it at the same time.

I also have a recipe book with some new additions. I first printed this several years ago & had requests for copies after it sold out, so I reprinted the book. It is a collection of great, simple dishes I've collected for well over 50 years.

2019 PERENNIAL PLANT OF THE YEAR

Stachys 'Hummelo'

This easy to grow perennial is in the same family as Lamb's Ear – the wooly silvery plant that grows very easily in this area. 'Hummelo' features basal rosettes of glossy bright green trouble-free foliage. Rose lavender flowers appear in dense spikes, rising well above the foliage, 1½ to 2 ft. tall in late June and July. Clumps spread over time to form a dense ground cover.

"Hummel" means Bumblebee in German which relates to the many pollinators visiting the flowers. The wiry stems on the bloom make for a great cut flower as well. Looks great with Purple Coneflower and Asclepias tuberosa (Butterfly weed). This is a tough little plant that will really perform for you. Plant in full sun to part shade. Considered deer resistant! Zones 4 to 8.

ALL-AMERICA SELECTIONS 2018 – yes 2018

All-America Selections winners have been grown, tested, exhibited, and judged in trial gardens all over the United States. They are always a great source for something new each year. Check out more information and color pictures on their web site at www.all-americaselections.org

BUT I am frustrated every year with the AAS team since they announce the largest majority of winners too late for the seed companies, tag companies, and growers to have them available. I am going to have to quit growing these, or maybe grow the winners a **year late**. We will have a few of the 2018 winners as listed below (They actually have picture tags this year!):

Pepper Habanero 'Roulette' - This is a Habanero pepper with NO HEAT! It has the nice citrusy flavor that regular Habaneros have without the burn!


Cuphea 'Floriglory Diana' is a Mexican Heather with larger, darker, more intensely colored magenta flowers. As always, Cuphea is a great plant to tolerate heat and weather variations.

Tomato 'Red Racer' - is a "cocktail" tomato, one that is slightly larger than a cherry tomato. This is a determinate plant, so it stays compact and would make a great container plant.

Zinnia 'Queeny Lime Orange' – has large dahlia-like blooms on compact 1½ - 2' plants. The unique blooms evolve from a dark coral/peach/orange to a light peach with a dark center. It also makes a great cut flower.

ANNUALS TO TRY IN 2019

Coleus 'Inferno' was one of our biggest hits of the season last year. I discovered it in a field trial in Michigan and was amazed at the color... it is indescribable. Practically everyone who saw it picked one or two up to take home. We also added 'Rediculous' which looks like a great Red variety and 'Sedona



Sunset' with more orange shades, as well as a great assortment of other colors. Sun Coleus can't be beat for good color all summer long. They grow in sun or shade, but color up best in sun.

Calliope (Dk Red, Salmon, Crimson Flame, Pink Flame, &Violet) & Caliente (Fire, Hot Coral, Lavender)

Geraniums are glorious colors. Both of these series are a cross between ivy and zonal geraniums giving the best of both worlds. Great in baskets, pots or the ground, you can't beat the wonderful blooms and colors! The hanging baskets fly out the door when they start to bloom. Don't delay if you want to try these!

We love all of the **Jolt Dianthus**, which look like Sweet William, but bloom all summer. '**Jolt Pink Magic**' is really striking since the blooms open pink and fade to white, you have several colors on the plant at one time.

Popcorn Plant would be great just for the smell of its foliage (hot buttered popcorn), but this giant has beautiful bright yellow blooms in the fall. A real novelty your kids and the young at heart will love!

Salvias are great for hummingbirds and pollinators and we have several great varieties this year: 'Ember's Wish', & 'Love & Wishes' in the "Wish" series, are 2-3 ft tall with great large blossoms that look impressive in the landscape, 'Rockin Fuchsia' & 'Rockin Deep Purple' are from Proven Winners and give some height to container plantings, 'Bodacious Rhythm & Blues' is an improved Black & Blue Salvia, and Salvia 'Mystic Spires' is back again this year (we don't know how we missed growing it last year). It is one of our favorites with foot long spikes of glorious blue flowers on 2 ft plants. We also have a compact version, related to Mystic Spires, new to us this year, 'Mysty' grows 18" tall.

Diamond Mountain Euphorbia is like the popular 'Diamond Frost' on steroids. A larger plant with the same tiny white flowers for bigger pots. This thrives in sun and heat!

Gomphrena Truffula Pink is another heat lover that had beautiful pink flowers tipped with yellow stamens. This is an improved version of 'Fireworks' that we grow from seed. You can't beat the color performance combined with heat and drought tolerance!

Penta Lucky Star is a wonderful series that reblooms faster than other Pentas. These were so pretty, we recommended them last year when we ran out of geraniums!

We have several nice Elephant Ears this year, Alocasia

Dark Star was my favorite last year with its sturdy dark
brown stems and dark glossy leaves. We have Colocasia

Nancy's Revenge mainly for the name, 'Mojito', with
speckled foliage, 'Black Coral', one of the best dark
black Elephant Ears and of course 'Thailand Giant' if you want to go big!

Red Sensation Cordyline is available this year as a great "spike" replacement.

Dutchman's Pipe is a novelty vine that bears a really unique bloom.

Callibrocoa Doublette Love Swept (double pink with a white edge) & Tangerine Punch (orange with a

dark eye) are new Proven Winners Million Bell varieties you will love.

Senico Angel Wings is a large leafed Dusty Miller type plant that makes a great statement.

Swiss Chard is one of our vegetable offerings, but can make a stunning decorative plant in a large pot or in the landscape.

Cardoon is another edible plant grown more for its huge presence in the garden with large silvery spiky foliage and thistle-like flowers. Dan, I finally grew this one again for you (you know who you are ②).

Cannova Canna is my favorite Canna variety. Great colors, clean foliage, nice height for containers!

Sunfinity Sunflower is a 4-5 ft. sunflower that repeat blooms all summer long!

Soiree Vinca is heat tolerant like regular vinca, but these are covered with tiny ½" blooms.

Mandevilla 'Designer White' and 'Garden Crimson' are an exciting addition to the Mandevilla line. Both are non-vining plants to be used like bedding plants! I saw the white variety planted with Dark Red Geraniums last summer in Europe & it was stunning!

I can't begin to describe all the wonderful **Petunias** from cuttings we have this year. You need to come early and get yours because the best colors go fast!

I'm sure I've missed your favorite annuals! You just have to come and browse the aisles to find what you will love the most this year!

NEW ROSE SELECTIONS FOR 2019

We have all types of roses every year, these are the new varieties for 2019.

'All Dressed Up' is a medium pink Grandiflora with an old-fashioned rose look.

'Artic Blue' is a Lilac Pink with a cream reverse Floribunda.

'Celestial Night has plum purple petals with raspberry reverse, and is another Floribunda.

'Life of the Party' has yellow blooms kissed with pink on the edges. This Floribunda has a strong fragrance.

We also carry **Knock Out** roses and a newer Shrub rose '**Top Gun**' which is resistant to the Rose Rosette disease.

PERENNIALS OF NOTE IN 2019

Like every year, I want to mention everything we grow, but I'll just have to restrain myself.

We have a lot of Hellebores 'Honeymoon Romantic Getaway', 'Honeymoon Spanish Flare', Wedding Party Confetti Cake', and 'Wedding Party True Love' that have special blooms. These are full size plants and some are even in bloom!

Hosta Lakeside Paisley Print is the AHG Hosta of the year this is a smaller Hosta with wide wavy green margins. Another fun Hosta is 'Shadowland Diamond Lake' it is a blue Hosta with large corrugated leaves. And we have lots of other pretty Hostas for you to check out.

Eucomis African Night is a Foxtail Lily with pink flowers, but I would grow it just for the wonderful broad purple foliage that emerges late in the spring.

We had **Phlox 'Bubblegum'** last year and everyone wanted **'Grape Lollipop'**. They are really great performers with good disease resistance and a long blooming season. **Phlox Cloudburst** combines the color of Tall Garden Phlox and a dome like habit, a billowy mound of lavender-purple flowers. **Phlox 'Earlibeauty Rose Bouquet'** blooms from May to July and occasionally into the fall. It is very clean and mildew resistant. We've had **Phlox 'Jeana'** in the past. This native has tiny, sweetly scented pink blooms.

German/Bearded Iris 'Bernice's Legacy' (a blend of garnet and cinnamon) & 'Earl of Essex' (white with violet veining) are both rebloomers. Siberian Iris 'Swans in Flight' (large white blooms), 'Over in Gloryland' (deep blue purple), and 'How Audacious' (stunning violet, yellow and white) all have great spiky foliage that looks good in the garden even when they are finished blooming.

We have a nice **Yarrow** 'Sassy Summer Lemon' is a taller variety with sturdy stems that look great during its blooming season.

Sedum 'Atlantis' is a new variegated variety, & **'Little Miss Sunshine'** has a neat mounded habit with bright yellow flowers.

I love all Peonies and try to get new varieties each year to add to my collection. We have ITOH Peonies Bartzella (a great yellow) & Scrumdidleumptious (a new variety with a beautiful bloom) these are a cross between tree and bush Peonies. 'Paul M Wild' is a dark red, 'Jacorma' is a late blooming rosy pink with very strong stems, 'White Cap' is a Japanese style with magenta petals and a creamy center, and 'Coral Charm' is a great coral peach color. We have several others as well. EVERY garden should have at least one Peony!

We have a lot of great **Clematis** including the more unique '**Roguchi**' with a blue bell shaped bloom & **tex.** '**Etoile Rose**' with a small bell shaped pink bloom

I like **Anemone** 'Fall in Love Sweetly' because it blooms in early fall when most other perennials are about finished for the year. This is a rose pink variety with semi double blooms. **Anemone** 'Wild Swan', a white bloom backed with blue and flowers from late spring until frost!

Coreopsis 'Uptick Yellow & Red' and 'Uptick Cream & Red' are great standouts in the Coreopsis family. More blooms and color in field trials!

Agapanthus 'Galaxy Blue' is a hardy variety that reblooms late in the season. Most Agapanthus has to be taken inside through the winter, but this is hardy to Zone 6!

Wisteria 'Blue Moon' is a Kentucky native vine that reblooms up to 3 times a season. Give it a sturdy trellis to climb.

Milkweed we have LOTS of varieties and LOTS of plants. Great for pollinators and the important Monarch!

Kniphofia 'Pyromania Backdraft' and 'Pyromania Rocket's Red Glare' are Red Hot Pokers with upright habit and reblooming!

Oregano 'Kirigami' is an ornamental Oregano with

showy purple green bracts from spring to fall.

We love **Poppies** with their connection to WWI and we have lots of varieties this year.

'Little Joe' Joe Pye Weed & 'Gateway' are great native plants for pollinators. These varieties are a little shorter than the species.

Penstemon 'Dakota Burgundy' and **'Dark Towers'** also known as Beardtongue, these are great hummingbird plants. Both have wonderful deep burgundy foliage that is attractive even without the pink blooms.

Epimedium is a great groundcover (with height) for dry shade. 'Amber Queen' is a stand-out variety with orange flowers on 24" long stems!

Rudbeckia 'American Gold Rush' is a Black-Eyed Susan producing heavily from July to September. This variety boasts great disease resistance.

Agastache 'Little Adder' is a great plant for pollinators with lots of lavender blue flowers on bushy plants. The foliage is fragrant.

Aralia 'Sun King' is looking really pretty this year. This bright gold leaved plant brightens up the shade garden and adds height as well, growing 3 ft tall.

We have several Lilies including these top performing hybrids, Lily **OT Hybrid 'Exotic Sun'** with double yellow blooms, and **LA Hybrid 'Original Love'** a showy deep orange-red with darker spots.

Artemesia 'Powis Castle' is one of the few Artemisias I will grow (most others are invasive). It forms a nice clump of soft silvery foliage to accent any sunny spot. We do have 'Silver Mound' this year as well.

Dictamnus - Gas Plant is pretty as well as fun. I can tell you how to "light a fire" in your garden with these!

Lychnis coronaria 'Blood Red' is a short-lived perennial that reseeds readily. I love the soft silvery foliage topped by striking red flowers. Common name is Rose Campion, and this is a variety we haven't carried for several years!

I've already crossed 10 names off the list because there just isn't space to list everything I want to highlight! Come see for yourself!



VEGETABLES AND GARDEN PLANTS


Glencoe Raspberry is a cross between a purple and red raspberry. This thornless variety grows in clumps and can even be grown in a pot.

I always like to try different plants, and this year we have an **Olive Tree 'Arbequina**' which is fairly cold tolerant, but still needs to come inside over the winter in our climate. We also have a **Tropical Fruit "Rack"** coming in mid-May which will include Lemon, Lime, Orange and other Citrus trees, Fig, Olive, Guava and Passion Fruit plants. If you want to try some exotic tropical plants, we will have them this year!

We have some really neat combinations of herb planters that are meant to be combined in drinks. They are called "Drinkables". Flavors include Basil Lemonade, Mint Julep, Pina Colada and Mojito! To make an infusion with herbs, put cold water or alcohol in a container. Slightly mash the fruit or foliage of fresh herbs and place them in the liquid. Chill in the fridge for an hour and then strain. Steep longer for stronger flavor.

A SHOUT OUT TO LYDIA LURKER

In 2002, Lydia Lurker essentially told me she was coming to work for me when she retired from Vectren! She and Jo Ann Holbrook both started that year and have been working for Hasting Plants for 17 years! This year Lydia will turn 95 in December, so if you do the math, that means she started working for Hasting Plants when she was 77 years old!!!!! Most people would be resting on their laurels at that point,



but Lydia wanted to work. She has been without a doubt my most dependable employee for all those years – and still comes 5 days a week (when we are not flooded out) all during planting season! 
Socks & Pizazz (the cats) are usually around, just not very visible.
